Cases unpack comfort for local children

Port St. Lucie -They've been featured on Ellen, the Today Show and on news broadcasts throughout the country.

Now Comfort Cases is coming to Okeechobee & the Treasure Coast.

Communities Connected for Kids is one of the latest partners in the Comfort Case craze, which



had its start eight years ago when founder Rob Scheer and his husband, Reece, became foster parents and noticed that some of the children coming to their Maryland home brought their belonging in garbage bags.

He gathered family and friends for a "packing day" and assembled the first Comfort Cases - backpacks full of pajamas, books, writing material and toiletries. The idea caught on, more packing days were planned and the project quickly grew into a 501c3 non-profit organization serving more than 40,000 youth in 39 states.

"We were so excited when our bags were delivered," said C.C. Kids Community Relations Director Christina Kaiser. "They are bright, sturdy, high-quality bags, and we can't wait to get them out to children."

Kaiser said overnight bags have been made available to children in the local foster care system for more than a decade thanks to the generosity of local donors. But Comfort Cases adds consistency to the project and expands it to more children and partners.

"We will share our bags with local protective investigators, who are usually the first responders to incidents of child abuse and neglect," Kaiser said. "They can keep a few in their cars, so they have them when they remove children from home.

In the clinic with nurse Pam

As October clouds roll in, we are reminded that winter is on its way. And with winter comes flu season - and your friendly Nurse-Pam reminder to have your children vaccinated.

On the fence about it? Consider this: 140 children in the United States died from flu last year, the deadliest flu season on record.

Flu vaccination is recommended for everyone over the age of 6 months, and Tamiflu can be used to treat flu symptoms within 48 hours of onset for infants 2 weeks or older. Here are some other flu

facts:

- It takes two weeks for the body to produce antibodies sufficient to fight the disease - so get your shot early
- Flu activity begins to increase in October, with the worst time between December and February
- Flu vaccines cannot cause the flu virus; they are made with non-living viruses or with just a gene from the virus
- The vaccine may reduce the severity of symptoms if you do get sick

Finally, Publix is giving \$10 gift cards with every flu vaccination this year. If you are a foster parent, be sure to get consent from your child's parent before getting the vaccine.
