I have been coordinating the Christmas gift collection for our local foster-care community for more than 20 years, and in that time, I have seen my share of end-of-the-year kindness, generosity and comradery.

I've learned over the years to not panic



when mistakes happen. With this project, things work out the way you wish everything did. Everyone takes personal accountability with the project. Every single person moves with purpose as if he or she truly believes an individual can make the difference - even if it's as simple as getting a gift to a child whose name was left off a sponsor list.

This year, I - yes, totally my error - left off AN ENTIRE CASELOAD of wish requests! We're talking 35 children! With my stomach sloshing around at my feet, I

picked up the phone and called or texted every single person I thought might be able to help.

I called Kristin West, at the Hands and Feet Foundation. I called the Foster Closet. I called the Forever Family project down in Fort Lauderdale. I called the St. Lucie County Toys for Tots program. And, of course, I let our Christmas partner, Guardians for New Futures, know what happened.

Within 20 minutes, we had our gifts! Every group was willing to help in some way - whether it was filling requests immediately with reserve toys or offering to donate whatever toys they had remaining after serving their own folks.

Gia Tutalo-Mote, the founder of Forever Family and south Florida news broadcaster, even offered to drive up from Miami to help out.

I won't lie. Sometimes, my husband and I think about leaving this area to be closer to our adult children. But it's moments like this when I feel so intimately connected to the world around me that leaving becomes unthinkable.

I don't know if it's the community or the time of year; whatever it is, it fills me up and reminds me of how fortunate I am to be a part of something so wonderful.

Behind the Mission: Foster Youth Back to Help with Christmas Drive

"I have been in and out of care growing up throughout my life," she said. "I have always had a passion for helping others, standing up for what's right and most importantly those in need."


The Month in Pictures (and Lights)
